EASTER JOY AND HOPE OF A CHINESE BISHOP

KIDNAPPING OF CONSECRATED AND LAY PERSONS IN HAITI

Canadian Religious Conference (CRC) calls for prayers for the welfare of seven consecrated Catholic men and women, along with three lay persons, kidnapped by an armed gang in Haiti on 11 April. The kidnappings are part of an ongoing crisis of violence and social disorder in Haiti arising from the political and economic instability of the past ten years. GET VACCINATED FOR THE COMMON GOOD

There has been concern from some members of the community about the ethics of the research practices and production of COVID-19 vaccines. In response, the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference follows the guidance of the Vatican's Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, in urging people to be vaccinated for their own health, and for the health of the wider community. POPE MEETS WITH UN REFUGEE AGENCY CHIEF

The UN High Commissioner for Refugees, Filippo Grandi, was received by Pope Francis last Friday, 16 April, where the two discussed the increasing conflicts and other causes of people fleeing their homelands, including specific areas, such as Central America, Venezuela and Lebanon. Grandi described the Holy Father as "one of the greatest champions of the cause of the most vulnerable" in the world today. ACADEMIC RESEARCH JUST PUBLISHED


Daly, K. and J. Davis (2021). Civil justice and redress scheme outcomes for child sexual abuse by the Catholic Church, *Current Issues in Criminal Justice*, DOI: 10.1080/10345329.2021.1895467

A number of Catholic organisations, including the ACBC General Secretariat, assisted Kathy Daly from Griffith University in Brisbane in her research for the above paper. Kathy notes: "It is, as far as we know, the first paper to compare outcomes (% receiving any payment and the average payments) from civil litigation and redress schemes for one offence category (varied as that is) and one organisational defendant (highly devolved as it is). The paper challenges speculation by some legal practitioners on money outcomes of civil justice and redress schemes for child sexual abuse by church personnel." <u>Read</u> the full article here.
